*Dear Fellow Servants of Christ Jesus,*

Many of you know I am a fan of Bob Dylan. He may be an acquired taste, but the way he puts some things just seems to stick with me. A number of years ago, Dylan wrote a song of faith entitled, "What Can I Do for You?" Part of the lyrics, (which are addressed to God) are:

*You have given all there is to give  
What can I do for You?  
You have given me life to live  
How can I live for You?*

*I know all about poison, I know all about fiery darts  
I don't care how rough the road is, show me where it starts.  
Whatever pleases You, tell it to my heart.  
Well, I don't deserve it but I sure did make it through.  
What can I do for You?*

This song summarizes my theology of stewardship. God has done so much for me and my offerings of time, talent and treasure are my ways of saying "Thank you, Lord." When I ask God, "What can I do for you?" God answers in a number of ways. This past year I felt God's call and began volunteering as a reading tutor at Chimborazo Elementary School. As with many things, I am sure I benefit much more from this than my reading buddy.

We direct the lion's share of this to Grace and Holy Trinity Church but we also support other efforts and we consider all our giving, to the church and otherwise, to be part of our response to God.

I certainly hope and pray that part of that answer will mean that you remember Grace and Holy Trinity Church and that you generously commit your time, talent and treasure to it. But each one of us must ask the question and listen for the answer.

As the "Showcase of Talent" has amply shown, the members of GHTC are an amazingly gifted group of people. It is my privilege to serve as your rector. I look forward to seeing what God has in store for us. And so, this is my prayer to God -

**On October 9th**, the Rev. Dr. Roger Ferlo will be with us. Professor Roger Ferlo joined the VTS faculty in 2004. He is currently Associate Dean and Director of the Institute for Christian Formation and Leadership, and professor of religion and culture. A graduate of Colgate, he completed his Ph.D. at Yale, focusing on the rhetoric of magic in the literature of the English Renaissance. He trained for the priesthood at the General Theological Seminary in New York City, and has served parishes in the dioceses of Georgia, Pittsburgh and New York, most recently for ten years as rector of the Church of St. Luke in the Fields in New York City. He is the author of *Opening the Bible* (volume 2 in the New Church's Teaching Series) and *Sensing God*, and the editor of *Heaven*. An avid amateur cellist, Dr. Ferlo plays in the orchestra of St. Columba's Episcopal Church in Washington, where he is a parishioner. His wife, Anne Harlan, a book artist, is the librarian at St. Patrick's Episcopal Day School in Washington, DC, and their daughter Liz is a chaplain and teacher in Oregon.

Dr. Ferlo will preach at all the morning services, and will lead the 10:00 adult class. Dr. Ferlo's books will be available for purchase and signing.

**On October 23rd**, the Rt. Rev. Richard Blackburn will join us from England. He is the Bishop Suffragan, the Bishop of Warrington. He was consecrated in November 2009. Bishop Richard assists the Bishop of Liverpool in the episcopal leadership of the diocese. He was born in Denmark and grew up in Yorkshire. Before ordination, Richard read Theology at St. John's College, Durham, England, where he was elected President of the Durham Union. After university he worked for the National Westminster Bank in London where he captained the Nat West Rowing Club in his spare time. He married Helen in 1980. Richard and Helen are keen walkers, they love music and the theatre and regularly attend concerts, opera and plays. Richard plays squash and would row if he could find the time. Bishop Richard is working with the Rev. Lauren Kuratko, and others here at GHTC, to put together our youth pilgrimage to London and Liverpool in June 2012.

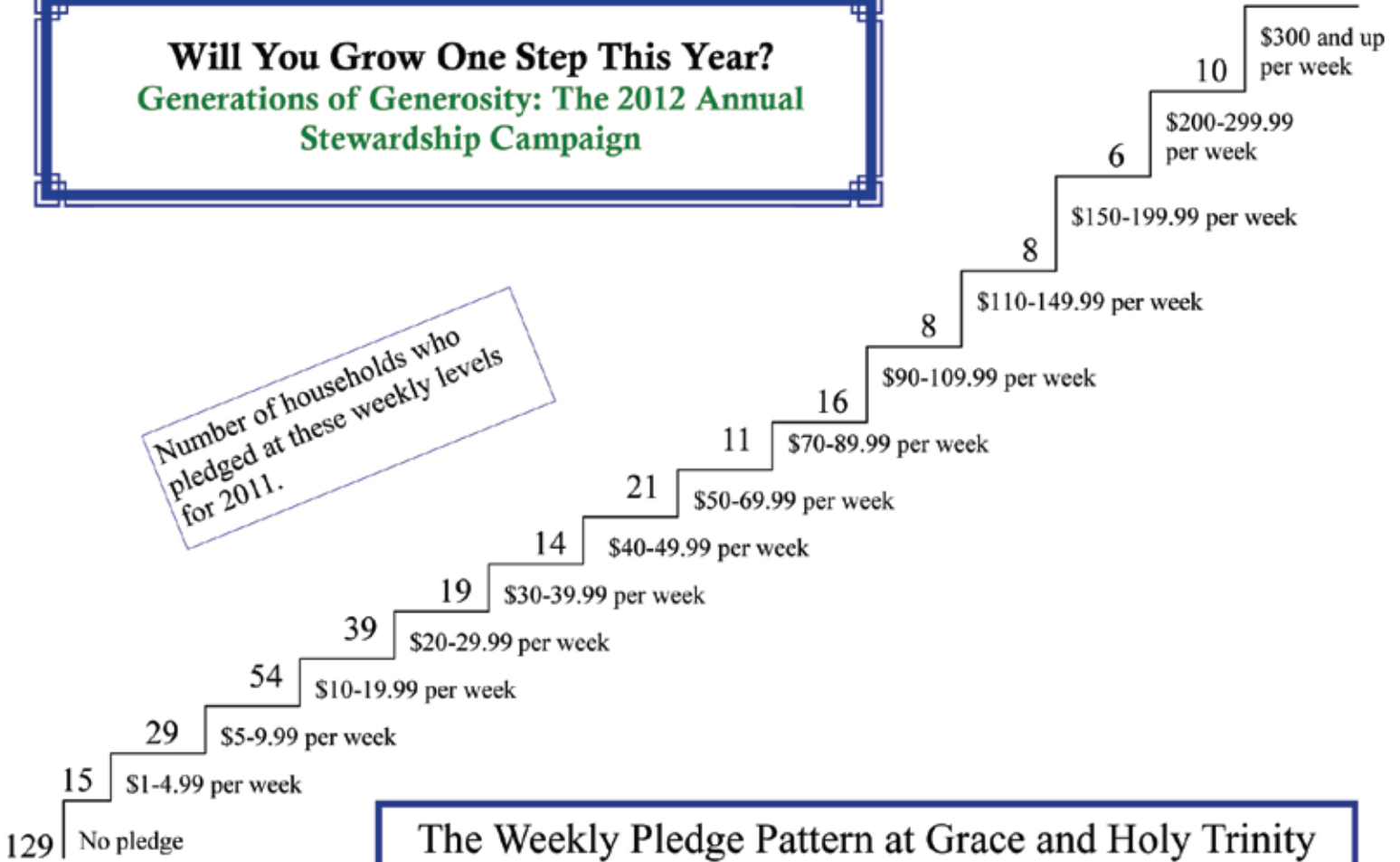
### *The Bus Has Arrived!!!*

## Grants and 1618 Fund:

Did you know that since 2005, GHTC has awarded over \$600,000 to agencies in the greater Richmond area? Historically, GHTC has funded grants through the program budget and monies granted from the Trustees of the Endowment. These grants have been awarded broadly to agencies in the community assisting in such areas as elder care, family case management, crisis management, food and other basic needs, health care, homeless services, and youth enrichment. The 1618 Fund distributes grants specifically to agencies that work in the area of early childhood development. ## Christmas Ministry

Each year, Grace & Holy Trinity Episcopal Church sponsors as many as 25 families, providing gifts for children 12 and under and food for holiday meals. Each sponsored family is adopted by individual parishioners, families of GHTC or different ministry groups. Typically, each child will receive a small toy and some articles of clothing. The guideline for spending for these gifts is \$25 per child. The Christmas Ministry will gather referrals through mid-October. Beginning in mid-November, information about the families that we will sponsor will be available for you to choose from. ## Your Time

Our Soup Kitchen is a 30+ year old ministry of GHTC. We gather every Friday to cook and serve Bean Soup, cornbread, canned peaches, and fruit to 70-100 guests who come to us from a broad spectrum of need and circumstances. The day basically goes in two shifts: the first, from 10:00am-noon, cooks and sets up; the second, from 12:45-2:30, serves and cleans up. From noon-12:45, the entire team eats lunch together. We are always welcoming new volunteers.

**At CARITAS** – Congregations around Richmond involved to assure shelter. If you are looking for meaningful service work with simplicity, our CARITAS program could be for you. We host approximately 40 homeless persons every evening from 4:30 – 5:45 while they prepare to be transferred to evening shelters in the area. We need volunteers to offer hospitality and check people in and out.

## Things

### Non Perishable Food

We are always collecting non-perishable food. Please find the collection bin in the back hallway, just outside the choir room. Often recipients of assistance will "browse" what we have on hand, but most often we pass what we have collected on to the Central Virginia Food Bank. The Central Virginia Food Bank (CVFB) serves 31 counties and 5 cities, but approximately half of those agencies are located in the Richmond Metro area.

Recipients of CVFB food and programs include, but are not limited to children, the elderly, the disabled, the newly unemployed, the mentally challenged, the homeless, the working poor, battered women, victims of natural disasters, and single-parent families

Of critical importance to the CVFB is stopping childhood hunger. Poverty and food insecurity negatively influence the diet and health of many low-income children. "Cooking For Jesus" is a ministry where Grace and Holy Trinity parishioners make a home cooked dinner for the Campus Ministry students. The dinner is served on Sunday nights, following the 5 pm service. Volunteers can sign up to cook as individuals, groups in the parish, or just a group of friends getting together to cook for the students. We usually serve about 25 students dinner each Sunday night. You can be reimbursed for your food expenses up to \$75- be sure to give the Rev. Lauren Kuratko your dinner receipts. 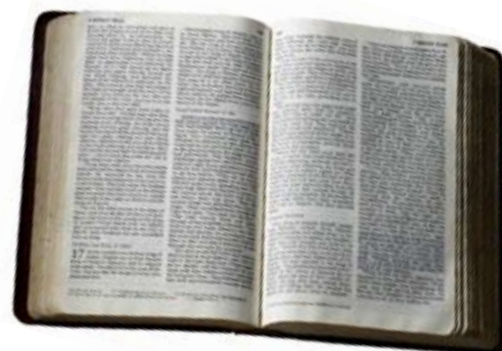
**Nov. 13th** – The Rev. Michael Cadaret presents on the book of Exodus and the covenant made between Yahweh and Israel on Mt. Sinai.
