Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Easter Day is April 24. On that day, and the 49 days following, we celebrate the resurrection. Of course, every Sunday of the church year is a celebration of Easter (which is why the Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days of that season) but our celebrations take on a special joy in the Great Fifty Days.

The resurrection is not some arcane doctrine that we believe in order to prove we have faith. It is not a logical problem to be solved. Resurrection is not something that can be fully understood on the one hand, or explained away on the other. At its core, resurrection is not something we talk about. Resurrection is a way of life.


The ancient Greeks speculated that the essence of a human being was an immortal spirit within the person. At death, this spirit is released. The Bible teaches that human beings are fully and completely mortal. Reflecting this, in the Burial Office of the Prayer Book (page 499) we say, Lord "You only are immortal, the creator and maker of mankind; and we are mortal, formed of the earth, and to earth shall we return."

In biblical teaching, human beings are this wonderful union of the physical enlivened by God's Holy Spirit. Thus, the Eucharistic Prayer in Rite I says, "...we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies." Beyond death, in God's good grace, and only through that grace, life is renewed. Resurrection means not that some small part of us survives, but that human beings are given new life, body and spirit (or soul). And not only that, but as the Book of Revelation has it, there will be a "new heaven and a new earth." The entire creation will become what God intended it to be from the beginning. Jesus Christ is the earnest payment on that future, he is the first fruits of this general resurrection. The transformation he underwent is what shall come to us all and to the entire created universe.

This means that resurrection is not about escape from this life or even simply about life after death. Resurrection is about engagement. It is about living now in the light of what shall be. As N. T. Wright says in a similar context, resurrection "refers...not to our escape from this world into another one, but to God's sovereign rule coming on earth as it is in heaven". (Surprised by Hope)

As we continue our Lenten journey and as we prepare to celebrate Easter, we renew our commitment to God's gracious future. What we think about the future and goal of this world matters to how we are going to live. Resurrection means that we are always, above, below and beyond everything, people of hope.

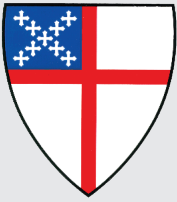

Mind the Gap - The Call

The Vestry adopted a deficit budget for 2011. When pledges were made in the Fall confidence in the economy was not strong and pledges decreased over all. However, at the end of 2010, the members of GHTC were very generous and the Church received more than it budgeted or expected. Given this hopeful sign, that when things are better the members of this great congregation share the blessings with their church, the Vestry decided not to slash vital programs. The Vestry stepped out in faith that the congregation could make up the deficit. If everyone gives \$172 over the course of the year (47 cents a day) the gap will be closed. We are also making mite boxes available for Lent. If everyone puts \$4.30 a day in the box during Lent, the gap will be closed by Easter. Of course, some folks already give 10% of their income away. Others are not in a position to increase. So perhaps some members can do more than \$172 to make up the difference. Thank you for your consideration and generous support.

Campus Ministry

Last month (March 13-19) our Campus Ministry went on our 6th Annual Mission trip to New Orleans. We had a really big group this year, 20 people (19 students plus Lauren Kuratko)! We thank you so much for your support of Episcopal Campus Ministry- thank you for your prayers, your love, and your financial support. The Shrove Tuesday dinner and auction was a great success. We were thrilled by the number of parishioners who came to Shrove Tuesday and are thankful for all of you who bought items in the auction. Thank you!

Dear diocesan family,

The story in Japan is still unfolding, as we have seen in the stunning pictures of the devastation caused by the earthquake and tsunami, and now there is an ever-increasing risk of nuclear incidents. The Most Rev. Nathaniel Makoto Uematsu, the archbishop of the Nippon Sei Ko Kai (the Anglican Church in Japan), is seeking to put structures in place so that the Church can minister and assist those who are affected by this dire situation. Archbishop Nathaniel has also called upon us to pray. As he so faithfully reminds us, "Prayer has power. I hope and request that you pray for the people who are affected, for those who have died and for their families. Pray for the people involved with the rescue efforts, and in particular pray for Tohoku and Kita Kanto dioceses and their priests and parishioners during this time of Lent." I hope you will make room in your daily prayer for the people of Japan, and ask our Lord to strengthen our brothers and sisters in the Nippon Sei Ko Kai. Shrine Mont Summer Camps

Summer 2011 at Shrine Mont

The summer program at Shrine Mont is a ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia. All of our camps offer a mixture of recreation, group building, spiritual development and just plain 'ol fun!

Registration for campers is currently open. For more information including information on scholarship availability, speak with the Rev. Michael Cadaret or The Rev. Lauren Kuratko, or review the camp pages on the diocese's website: <http://camps.thediocese.net>. Descriptions of the different camping programs follow:

- **Senior High Youth Conference (SHYC) - SHYC** is a camp for high school aged youth focused on giving back to the community. Expect to challenge and stretch yourself physically and spiritually while having a ton of fun and hanging out with awesome people! Bible study, helping others, dance parties and much more will happen during your week at SHYC!

- **Explorers' Camp** - Enjoy the outdoors! Take time to explore the world around us; play in the dirt, go hiking, camping, swimming, and canoeing – always looking a little closer to see God in all we do.

- **Explorers' the Great** - This one-session event is for the camper that wants to wander through the wilderness, forage the forest, and breathe in the back country. We will take our camp and ourselves on extended trips into the wild to truly dwell in God's magnificent creation.

- **St. Sebastian's Sports Camp** - St. Sebastian's Sports Camp is a great place for young athletes to play all of their favorite games while learning the values of teamwork, sportsmanship, and the importance of staying fit.

- **Art Camp** - Express yourself! At Art Camp we work on projects in a variety of media, allowing campers to express their individuality and creativity. We explore how this creativity can bring us closer to God while also enjoying all the usual camp activities.

- **St. Elizabeth's Camp** - St. Elizabeth's Camp provides individuals with mild to moderate disabilities the opportunity to participate in traditional camp activities in a supportive environment. Our campers have their own volunteer counselor buddy who will be a constant friend and assist in daily activities. Together they will stay in log cabins and share many exciting activities including swimming, canoeing, worship, art, and fishing. A typical St. Elizabeth's camper is between 14-25 years old, attends to personal needs independently, and effectively communicates with others.

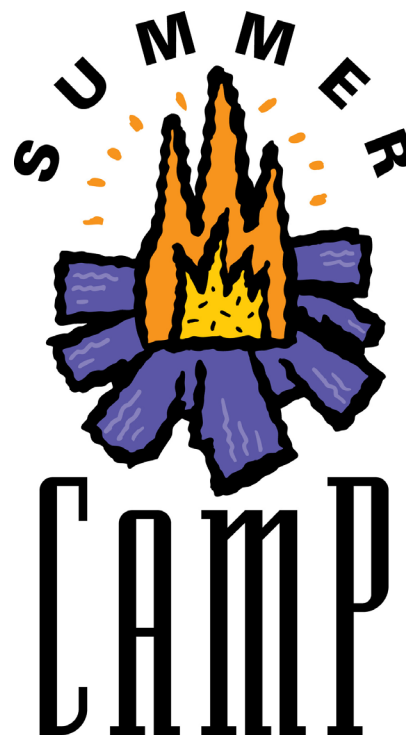
- **St. George's Camp** – St. George's Camp is a classic large summer camp featuring hiking, swimming, sports, music, crafts, canoeing, and overnight camp-outs all flavored with dearly-held traditions of zaniness! The heart of St. George's Camp is its focus on the unique and infinite value of every member of the camp community. With I Corinthians 12-27 as a point of reference we encourage both faith and questions as we strive to celebrate the unique gifts of every camper, regardless of his or her faith background or commitment.

- **St. Andrew's Camp** - Avoid the crowds at St. Andrew's Camp. This is an intimate, "family-style" camp setting offered for children who thrive in an environment with high levels of structure and personal attention. The small number of campers allows kids to be introduced to a camp program that is less overwhelming in size, but still offers camping, art, swimming, singing, sports, and worship together.

- **Music and Drama Camp** - Let your voice be heard! Music and Drama (MAD) is a high-energy camp focused on the preparation of a biblically based musical that features the unique talents of each performer. Campers make the musical their own by learning songs and movements and creating sets and costumes. In addition, we swim, hike, play games, worship and make life-long friends. The oldest session takes their show "on the road". Campers tour around the Shenandoah Valley performing their show, meeting enthusiastic audiences, and attending a professional musical.

• **Camp Alfresco** - Are you a young adult in your 20's and 30's who misses the excitement and fun of summer camp? Join us on a short camping trip with other Christians your age as we sing, hike, canoe, philosophize, and laugh our way back home. • **Family Conference** - The Family Conference is the summer place to be- whether you are single, married, with or without children. There are activities like hiking, dramatic and craft arts, cookouts, bonfires, swimming, and exploring- not to mention Shrine Mont traditions like relaxing, reading, "porching," enjoying nature and the company of other people. Afternoons are open to enjoy nearby attractions like golf, antique stores, and historic battlefields. Adult Forum in April

April 3rd Peter Paul Development Center

Peter Paul Development Center is an outreach and community center serving Church Hill and neighboring communities in Richmond's East End. The Center was founded in 1979 and for 28 years operated out of the parish hall of St. Peter's Episcopal Church. PPDC is the oldest community-based agency continually serving Church Hill children and families. The Center gives children a safe, consistent, structured, and loving environment in which to thrive. Staff and volunteers establish long-term relationships of trust and support for the children and their families. Currently, PPDC serves 96 youth ages 8 to 18.

Mayor's Youth Academy Work Initiative

The Vestry of Grace and Holy Trinity Church decided to support this Initiative last year and is doing so again for the summer of 2011. Here is how it works: High School students in the City of Richmond apply and if accepted they commit to a 12 week program. The first six weeks are built around classes and activities that teach skills needed for the work place. The students learn about the importance of timeliness, dress and professional behavior. Then, for the second six weeks, the students are placed in internships in businesses around the metropolitan area. The businesses agree to pay the students \$1200 for the internship. Last year, our goal was to find places for 10 students, which we did. This year, we hope to place even more students.

Bishop Gulick To Visit for Confirmation, May 15th

The Rt. Rev. Edwin F. “Ted” Gulick Jr., became the assistant bishop on January 1, 2011. Bishop Gulick returns to his native Virginia from the Diocese of Kentucky, where he served as diocesan bishop from 1994-2010.

A native of northern Virginia, Bishop Gulick received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Lynchburg College in 1970 and a master of divinity degree from Virginia Theological Seminary in 1973. He also holds honorary doctor of divinity degrees from Virginia Seminary and the University of the South.

Bishop Gulick served as a parish priest for 20 years before his election as Bishop Of Kentucky.

As the Diocese of Kentucky’s bishop, Gulick was chief pastor to its clergy and 34 congregations. Speaking of his tenure in Kentucky, Bishop Gulick said he was particularly proud of the caliber of clergy he recruited. Because of the excellence of their leadership, he said, the attendance in the diocese’s churches grew 30 percent. He also highlighted the diocese’s commitment to youth and young adult ministries and the formation of seminarians.

In 2008, Gulick earned the distinction as the first Episcopal bishop to head two dioceses simultaneously when he was asked by Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori to serve part time as the provisional bishop of Diocese of Fort Worth, which was being reconstituted after the prior bishop and diocesan convention separated from the Episcopal Church. In the wider church, Bishop Gulick undertook a particularly active role in ecumenism serving on committees for the Episcopal Church in the U.S., and for the Anglican Communion.

Generations of Generosity

I like to sit in the back of the church sometimes because it lets me “spy” on people. I see generations of families together in worship – grandparents with children and grandchildren. Sometimes they’re all sitting together, sometimes the grandchildren are with the grandparents only, and the parents are a few pews away, having some quiet time with each other and God. Some of the children are elementary age. Some are college age. They’re here mostly at holidays now. There are people sitting alone, people sitting with friends. I see teenagers—they are often sitting together as a group. I love to watch the toddlers playing in the pews, wandering in the back of the church, sometimes escaping all the way down the aisle toward the front.

I like to watch people go forward for communion. Do you do that? Here are all God’s people together at Grace and Holy Trinity Church; some short, some tall; some hopping and skipping, some with a cane or walker; some here for the first time, some who are fourth generation in this place.

I like to look at the stained glass windows and read the plaques beneath them. The windows tell a biblical story or the story of how someone’s life was touched by God. Perhaps it was in 1890, maybe 1920...generations of Grace and Holy Trinity Church people who sat in these pews and listened to these same stories, and left us their story through our beautiful windows.

“We will tell to the next generation the glorious deeds and the wonderful works of the LORD.” (Psalm 78:4) We do this through the telling of our stories and God’s story. We do it through the gift of our time: our presence here for worship, our prayers during the week, and our work in the world. We do it through the gift of our talents in our service within this parish community and out in the world. We do it through the gift of our financial resources to make and maintain not only this physical place but also the ministries that go on every day.

We are generations of people telling and celebrating God’s story. Throughout 2011 our stewardship and evangelism efforts will focus on just this...telling to the next generation the glorious deeds and the wonderful works of the Lord. What is your story of a time or place when God has touched your life? Who will you share it with?
