
There are many ways we can do that at Grace and Holy Trinity Church. First and foremost, we can attend worship on Sundays. I think of weekly, corporate worship as the hub of the wheel and everything else we do as spokes moving out from there. We are created in the image of God and worship keeps us in touch with that blessing. As the prophet Jeremiah has said, “We become what we worship.” God offers himself as an object of worship, so that we might be the people God created us to be. Worship “shines” the image of God within us, which is otherwise tarnished by sin and by the worship of idols (power, sex, money, status and so on).

Sundays also provide great opportunities for learning, through our Sunday School and wonderful opportunities for fellowship, through things like breakfast and coffee hour. But of course, our work extends throughout the week. You are strengthened through your attendance on Sunday to carry God’s grace out into the world Monday through Saturday. GHTC itself also has a number of efforts which thrive on your participation and passion....from weekly small groups, to the soup kitchen, to pastoral care ministries, to working in the schools, to singing in the choir, to evangelism and on and on.

In the end, through God’s grace, we don’t “go to church” but rather, “we are the church.” What a blessing that we can give ourselves to God in this way. I will leave you with this prayer.

Everliving God, whose will it is that all should come to you through your Son Jesus Christ: Inspire our witness to him, that all may know the power of his forgiveness and the hope of his resurrection; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. (Book of Common Prayer, page 816)

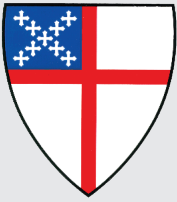

We also believe that we exist not just for ourselves, but for God and for God's world. We live out this mission through a variety of ministries represented by the acronym SWEEPPS: Service, Worship, Education, Evangelism, Pastoral Care, Parish Life and Stewardship. Service Ministry in 2010

The congregation of Grace and Holy Trinity knows God's grace in powerful ways. We know God's grace in His generous provision in our individual lives and in our life together as the Body of Christ. We know God's grace in His call which has bestowed upon us the blessed and challenging vocation of serving others, particularly the needy in our community.

I need not elaborate on the trying economic times in which we find ourselves. Needless to say, the needy in our community have found their lives on even more tenuous ground, and we have seen a significant increase in requests for financial assistance. While it is often painful to confront these realities, God is deeply present in the faces and voices of those who reach out to us for help. We are reminded of how deeply God loves us and how generously He provides for us. We are reminded of our own neediness and vulnerability. We are reminded that we need not respond to our own needs and those of others out of anxiety or a sense of lack. Because we know of God's love for us and all, we can respond with joy, hope, generosity and love.

The give and take of God's call to us and our response is humbling, no doubt. And it is with a sense of humility and gratitude that I give you the news of one significant area through which this give and take has played out: Service Ministries. In 2010, the Grace and Holy Trinity congregation volunteered thousands of hours to community service, served an average of 74 people each Friday through the Soup Kitchen which remained open after Thanksgiving and on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve (that over 3,000 meals served), and gave over \$120,000 to the needy in our community through grants and emergency relief.

Jesus says, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me." This is one of God-given vocations, and it is both a blessing and a challenge.

In January we will experience two seasons of the church year.

Christmas, of course, began on December 25th and lasts for 12 days. On January 2, the Second Sunday of Christmas (and the ninth day) we will continue our celebration of the Incarnation. At the 11:00 a.m. service that day we will offer Lessons and Carols. (This will be our Daily Office service for January.) Last year, due to snow, we had to move this service from Advent into the Christmas season. We discovered that it is a great way to buck cultural trends (which starts Christmas prior to Thanksgiving and drags the trees to the gutter on December 26th!) and truly experience time as the Church would have it. After the stress of "the holidays" we can gather in peace and tranquility to unwrap the most precious gift of all, Christ Jesus.

The second season we experience in January is that of Epiphany. Epiphany begins with a Feast Day on January 6 and continues until Lent starts with Ash Wednesday on March 9. In Epiphany, (a Greek word meaning "manifestation") we traditionally take in the great stories of the Magi, the changing of water into wine and the Transfiguration. Having bathed in the Light of Christ through these stories, we also renew our efforts to share the light (another way of saying, we undertake evangelism).

January 9, the First Sunday after the Epiphany, is one of the designated baptismal festivals of the church. We will have baptisms that day and will also have the opportunity to renew our Baptismal Vows at each service. This festival takes precedence and so we will have Eucharist on the 9th at 11:00 a.m. and not Daily morning Prayer. As noted, Lessons and Carols on January 2 will be our "Daily Office" service for January.

In February, and appropriately as a part of Epiphany, we will observe our "Month of Mission" with guest preachers and congregational meeting. The meeting will take place on February 6 and will include Vestry elections. The Rev. Dr. Barney Hawkins of the Virginia Seminary will be with us as will Susan Ricky of the International Hospital for Children. We are also pleased the Rev. Dr. Dwight Jones, Pastor of First Baptist Church (Southside) and Mayor of Richmond will be our preacher on February 27.

To summarize, throughout the month of January, as we observe Christmas and Epiphany, we will have our regular morning schedule: Worship at 7:45 a.m., 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. with breakfast at 9:15 a.m. and Sunday School for everyone at 10:00 a.m. We will not have our 5:00 p.m. service on January 2, but it will be offered the rest of the month.

Spreading the Good News

The word 'evangelism' comes from the Greek word *euangelion* and means "good news." Evangelism is, simply, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with others. The Great Commission in Matthew's Gospel (28:19-20) commands us to go into the world with this good news:



Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.

At Grace and Holy Trinity, you can help us share the good news in three ways:

Invite your neighbors and co-workers to join us for worship or at other parish events. At least half of our Sunday visitors are here because someone invited them and brought them to church. Some of our best evangelists are children and youth so please encourage all the members of your family to invite friends to GHTC.

Many people are more open to a first time visit to a church event rather than a worship service. It may feel less intimidating. Invite your friends and colleagues to a parish dinner or breakfast, the ping-pong tournament or other event.

Welcome all those visiting with us. At all events, and especially Sunday worship, please speak to those you don't know, invite them to join you at the breakfast table and introduce them to others. Wearing your name tag is also a sign of welcome – it removes the burden of remembering names especially for those who are new members.

Incorporate newcomers and guests into our activities and worship. Ask guests and new members to attend a Sunday class with you, or sit with you at worship. You can also tell them about programs that you're involved in and what that involvement means to you.

Thank you for making our parish an outpost of God's love for all!

Pastoral Care...It is Not Just by the Clergy

The care that members and friends of GHTC provide to one another as we build a strong church community, is an essential part of pastoral care. Here's how you can participate:

Write a note. Note cards are kept at the back of the church so you can pick one up on Sunday and write a note to someone who was lifted up in prayer.

Knit a prayer shawl. These are given out to members and friends so that they can literally be wrapped in our prayers. Contact Betsy Featherstone.



Random Acts. This ministry reaches out to those who are the primary caregivers for others. These contacts are regular and non-obtrusive and have met with great thanksgivings from the caregivers. Being a care-giver can be a very lonely existence the recognition our Church gives is a great blessing. Contact Mary Lietman.

Lay Pastoral Visitors. This group calls on those who are not able to be as active as they once were. Contact Bo Millner.

Pastoral Care Team. This group meets periodically to assess the need for further ministries and then to design responses. Contact Bill Derry.

Pray. Each week members of this ministry receive a list of prayer requests. This list is confidential which means that the members will make one on one contact, via telephone or a letter with the person being prayed for but otherwise will not discuss it. Prayers of the People. We pray, in public, as a part of our worship for a number of people each week. To maintain appropriate boundaries and confidentiality, anyone placed on this list, must have given their permission. This means that it is appropriate for you to make contact with them, through a note, for instance. Names placed on the list will remain there for six weeks and unless further contact is made by you, the name will be removed. Contact Valerie Aussanaire.

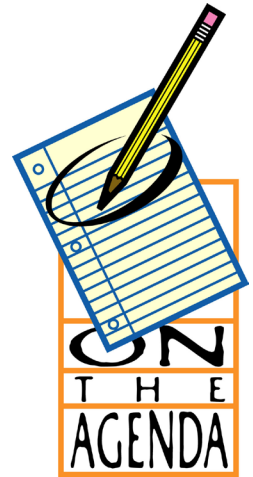
Pastoral Care by the Clergy

All three of our clergy, the Rev. Lauren Kuratko, the Rev. Michael Cadaret and the Rev. Bo Millner, desire to walk with you in the good times (such as weddings) and in the difficult times (marital conflict, job loss and so on). Do not assume that they know what you are going through but be in contact with them directly. You will find them remarkably responsive. The clergy meet once a week to go over an extensive list of people with expressed needs and to plan timely contacts.

Also, please remember that a member of the clergy is on-call twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year. Call Bo Millner's number (359-5628 ext 17) for a recording which will tell you who is on-call when and how to reach them.

Staff Meeting - Wednesdays at 2:00 p.m.

The staff of GHTC, including both sextons, (Tina Roberts, James Fleming), our Financial Secretary and Parish House Manager (Judy Miller), our Administrative Secretary (Valerie Aussanaire), our Receptionist (Barbara Hobson-Simpson), the Assistant for Evangelism and Stewardship (Carolyn Chilton), the Assistant for Music Ministries (Dr. Beth Davis), the Assistant for Youth, Campus Ministry and Pastoral Care (the Rev. Lauren Kuratko), the Assistant for Service, Education and Pastor Care, (the Rev. Michael Cadaret) and the rector (the Rev. Bo Millner) meet once a week at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesdays. If you have something for the calendar or concerning an effort you are undertaking please be in touch with the appropriate staff member so that it can be put on the agenda. The staff as a whole can help co-ordinate various efforts and work to make sure that the ministries work together. Since GHTC has become more and more active this is a happy challenge!



Communication at Grace and Holy Trinity Church

We live in an age of information overload. It used to be said, "You have to tell someone something 7 times before they actually hear it." The church, following this advice, would overwhelm people with posters, numerous bulletin inserts, countless mailings etc. At GHTC we are working hard to communicate effectively and also to create "sanctuary" not static. There are times when we utilize things like a special mailing or special bulletin inserts, of course. But generally speaking we utilize three things to facilitate communication without contributing unnecessarily to "information overload." They are:

1. The Anchor...the monthly newsletter of Grace and Holy Trinity Church. This is mailed to those who choose and for others, you can read it in an electronic version. If you choose to receive it electronically, you will find links on the web page and also there are links in the weekly eNews. You can download it and read it as a PDF file. The Newsletter gives you a "longer" view of what's happening. The publication schedule for this, due to the post office and to the printers, is early. (For instance, the due date for articles for this Newsletter was December 16.) This date is published in each newsletter and you can submit articles to Valerie Aussanaire.



2. The weekly eNews. This is sent out each Wednesday and typically focuses on what is happening more immediately. Please submit contributions to both Bo Millner and Carolyn Chilton (they share this effort) by Tuesday morning. To sign up, just send Bo an e-mail (bmillner@ghtc.org).



3. The weekly bulletin. We try to keep this down to one page so you are not overwhelmed and you can easily take it home with you to inform your prayers and participation. Please submit announcements to Valerie Aussanaire by Tuesday morning.

Utilizing these three venues, we do our best to help members of the parish communicate with one another. You can help by reading all three and by making submissions to all three.

What is acolyting?

Acolyting is a variety of ways to help the priests conduct the service.



Why be an acolyte?

You can serve God by serving the church in an important way,
You can learn some responsibility and grow spiritually,
Impress your parents,
You can have something to do during the service.

What would I have to do?

There are a variety of positions and important ways to participate in the service. In the beginning, you may be asked to carry a torch or banner, then move up to higher acolyte duties of presenting the offertory plates, serving the priest during communion, carrying the little cross or carrying the big cross.

How do I start?

We will have a training class on Sunday after the 11:00 service and then we'll add you to the schedule within the next couple of months. We'll start you out with the easier jobs of carrying a torch or a banner. We often need substitutes, so there will opportunities to serve more often than you are scheduled.

Stewardship – 100% Participation
