Dear Friends in Christ,

“Mind the gap!” If you have ever traveled on the subway in London, you will have heard that public announcement. It is a warning not to fall into the gap between the train and the boarding platform.

At Grace and Holy Trinity Church we also have a gap to mind. If you attended the Annual Meeting you know a deficit budget was presented. Pledges fell short and expenses have increased. In order to sustain our ministries at the current level we need an additional \$43,000.

In the Fall, when pledges were being made, people’s confidence in and experience of the economy was not good. Since then, things seem to be moving in a more positive direction. We trust that if things continue to improve, the congregation will share the benefits with the church.

We believe we saw evidence of this at the end of last year. We ended 2010 with a surplus of \$36,000 due to increased revenue and to good stewardship of expenses. The generosity of parishioners beyond what was pledged and budgeted was overwhelming. Thank you!

I’d like to issue a challenge –for us to mind the gap- so that we can fully fund the ministries we enjoy. We have 250 pledges for 2011 and if every pledger agreed to raise that pledge by \$172 we would close the gap. There are also folks who do not pledge but who give regularly and their support of “closing the gap” can be a great help.

Of course, I know that some folks already give 10% of their income away. Others are not in a position to increase. But perhaps others can do more to make up the difference.

One Hundred and Seventy-two dollars is a significant amount of money but not overwhelmingly large. It tracks out at about 47 cents a day over a year. But if all of us make that offering, do you know what we get? Fully funded ministries at GHTC...a tremendous value! Even if I double that to a dollar a day or triple it to a dollar fifty a day, it is still a great value.

Let’s see if we can close the gap by Easter. Lent starts with Ash Wednesday on March 9 and Easter falls on April 24. Would you consider making a gift during that period, in addition to your pledge, in the amount of \$172 (or \$365 or \$550) so that we can close the gap? Thank you for prayerfully considering this sacrificial gift.

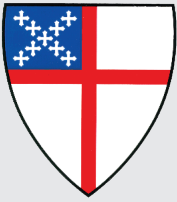
We’ll make mite boxes available this Lent to help “close the gap.” If everyone who pledges put \$4.30 a day in the box for each of the forty days of Lent, on Easter the gap would be gone.

Speaking of Lent, please consult the inside of this newsletter for our mid-week programs. We have some new things planned and I think you will enjoy them. You can read all about Wednesdays in Lent, about Ash Wednesday and about Holy Week inside. I look forward to walking through the season with you and it is my privilege to invite you, “...in the name of the Church to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God’s holy Word.” (Book of Common Prayer, page 265)

Emergency Relief

To recap 2010, GHTC donated over \$27,000 in emergency relief funds to the needy in the Greater Richmond community. These funds assisted with prescription medications, power and utility bills, heating oil bills, rent and housing issues, food, and miscellaneous other needs. We worked with agencies such as CrossOver Ministries, the Daily Planet, Freedom House, Area Congregations Together in Service (ACTS), the Richmond City Department of Social Services, and the Richmond Behavioral Health Authority. We fielded over 1800 contacts by phone or walk-in traffic.

As 2011 moves forward, the poor still have cold days ahead of them and they face few opportunities to better their circumstances. Thus, more and more need is presented to us daily. Please continue to keep this vital parish ministry in your prayers, and consider donating an extra gift to Service Ministries Emergency Relief.

Soup Kitchen

We'd love your help at Soup Kitchen. Typically the day runs in two shifts: the first runs from 10:00 a.m.-noon, and we cook and set-up; the second runs from about 12:30-2:30 p.m., and we serve and clean up. Everyone (both shifts) tends to gather around noon for lunch together. Many people overlap the two shifts while some volunteers come for one part of the day or the other. We serve from 1:00-1:45 p.m. If you have questions, please contact the Rev. Michael Cadaret or just show up and jump in.

March 27th Crossover Ministries

Established by volunteers in 1983, CrossOver offers a full continuum of healthcare services to the uninsured that includes: family medicine, primary care, obstetrics and pediatrics, podiatry, dental and vision care, mental health care, HIV diagnosis and treatment, and critical medications. CrossOver operates a network of 3 free clinics located in areas of identified need in Richmond, serving over 5,200 individuals annually.

April 3rd Peter Paul Development Center

Peter Paul Development Center is an outreach and community center serving Church Hill and neighboring communities in Richmond's East End. The Center was founded in 1979 and for 28 years operated out of the parish hall of St. Peter's Episcopal Church. PPDC is the oldest community-based agency continually serving Church Hill children and families. The Center gives children a safe, consistent, structured, and loving environment in which to thrive. Staff and volunteers establish long-term relationships of trust and support for the children and their families. Currently, PPDC serves 96 youth ages 8 to 18.

April 10th – Kirk Gibson, Development Director of Shrine Mont

Each year, children and youth from Grace and Holy Trinity attend camps and diocesan youth weekends at Shrine Mont, and each year the members of the parish head to Shrine Mont for a retreat weekend of rest, exploration, fellowship and worship. Shrine Mont is home to the Cathedral Shrine of the Transfiguration, the diocesan summer camp program, and numerous diocesan conferences, parish retreats, family reunions, etc. Kirk Gibson serves as the Development Director and will be with us to introduce us more fully to all Shrine Mont has to offer.

April 17th, May 1st & 8th – Adult Confirmation Preparation- Interested? Contact the Rev. Michael Cadaret

On Sunday May 15th, the Rt. Rev. Edwin Gulick, Assisting Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia, will be with us to preside over confirmations, to receive members into the Episcopal Church, and bless the reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows.

Confirmation is always set the context of the Baptism which the Episcopal Church understands Baptism to be full and complete initiation into the Body of Christ. In the sacramental rite of Confirmation, one publicly affirms one's faith in Christ, commitment to the Church, and acceptance of responsibilities of the Baptismal Covenant. Through the laying of hands by the Bishop, the confirmand's continued baptized life and ministry is put in relationship with the ministry of Christ's apostles. The Church expects those who are baptized at an early age to make this public and mature affirmation and renewal. In order to assist those who intend to do so, the Church expects that confirmands will be prepared for this rite through a course of study.

The Adult Forum on April 17th, May 1st & 8th will be a course on Episcopal Church basics, and while it is open to all who are interested, it will serve as a preparatory course for those who are interested in being confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church.

Pilgrimage to Jerusalem

St George's College Jerusalem is a Continuing Education Center of the Anglican Communion. The college is on the grounds of the Anglican Cathedral in East Jerusalem and is ten minutes' walk from the Old City of Jerusalem. The school is located in a three story building contains 20 dorm rooms capable of housing up to 40 students. The 21,000 volume library is one of the largest English language libraries in Jerusalem. In January and February of 2012, St. George's College will offer its introductory courses "The Palestine of Jesus" and "The Bible and its Setting." The Revs. Michael Cadaret and Lauren Kuratko are interested in leading a group from GHTC on one of these courses. Wednesday Evenings in Lent

On March 23rd, 30th, April 6th and 13th, we will gather at 6:00pm in the church for contemplative prayer and worship. Dinner will follow with discussion of Kenneth Leech's book "We Preach Christ Crucified". Kenneth Leech is the founder of Centrepoin, one of the biggest programs for homeless youth in Europe, and former field officer for racial justice for the Church of England and community theologian at St Botolph's Church in Aldgate, London. He is the author of many highly regarded books, including *Soul Friend*, *The Eye of the Storm*, *True Prayer*, and the award-winning *Care and Conflict*. In "We Preach Christ Crucified", he draws from his own prayer, study of the Bible, and encounters with others to offer a rich account of the resurrection for today. The themes of suffering and healing, justice and compassion, and Christ's dying and rising all come together in a compelling theology of discipleship and ministry. Both of these Bibles use the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible which is what we read in church and is the best translation available in English.

The Stewardship of Lent - *Carolyn Chilton*

When I was a child growing up in the Shenandoah Valley, I recall that our Lutheran church focused on two aspects of the sacrificial nature of Lent. One was a mite box. My parents placed it on the kitchen table, and each day they would put coins in it. I don't recall that I put any coins in the box. I watched. The second thing was no meat on Friday. You need to understand that this was a big deal in our house – my parents raised all of our food including all the meat. We ate a lot of meat, especially beef. No meat at dinner was noticeable. My brothers complained. That was noticeable too.

Somewhere along the line, I developed a dislike for Lent. Who likes to do without something they love? "Where's the beef?" could have been my motto. In our early thirties my husband John and I were living in Columbia SC. I was the volunteer Christian Education Director at our small church, and I confessed to our Rector, Bob, that I didn't like Lent. He asked why, and I explained that I just couldn't make the connection between giving up something and the theology of Lent. "What's giving up chocolate got to do with my spiritual life?" I asked. The Senior Warden chimed in that he was giving up ax murders for Lent. "See," I said to Bob, "that's my point. He's not even giving up something real for heaven's sakes. What's it got to do with making us better Christians?"

Bob rose to the occasion. Lent, he said, is the season that the church has set aside for us to intentionally reflect on our relationship with God, others, and

ourselves. It is a time to reflect on those things that bring us closer to God and others, and those things that keep us alienated from God and others. Bob encouraged me to add something to my life in Lent, not take something away. So I began what has since become a yearly discipline. I've added such things as special daily readings, a Lenten retreat, daily worship, a spiritual discipline such as centering prayer and volunteering with the less fortunate.

Clever Bob. By adding these types of disciplines to my life, I began to take away, or give up, other things. Out of one of these Lenten habits I developed the practice of giving away at least two articles of clothing every time I buy a new one. It's a small thing that has made a big impact in my life. Another time, I developed the habit of the mite box! (Isn't it amazing what children learn by just watching?!) Now I give away additional monies in Lent. Another time I gave away old grievances, and rebuilt some relationships. I'd never pledged to the church, so one year I said, "Shoot, I'll make a 6 week Lenten pledge to the church and we'll see how THAT works!" It worked. I can't not pledge anymore. Giving draws me closer to God because I have to do without some of the material things of this life that I love. And when I move them out of the way, God moves in.

We are here as God's stewards. You and I are called to learn generosity by giving. We are called to model it for children. What are you taking on and giving up for Lent?
